
# School Safety Update

- Morning school bag checks
- WCHS metal detectors arrived and have been implemented
- Weekly calls with NYPD and area schools
- Continued police presence in front of school
- Continued police presence along common corridors to provide safe passage at arrival and dismissal, plus at subway stations



# **GROW Community Coalition and Rally**

- GROW, WCHS' anti-gun violence coalition, drafted and released a <u>petition on Change.org</u> and it already has 1000+signatures.
- The petition calls for an end to youth gun violence through expanded partnerships with the NYPD, creation of legislation in support of school to school information sharing, improved use of violence interrupters in our communities, additional funding for school social emotional supports, and increased attention on afterschool programs and job opportunities for our youth
- WCHS is hosting an anti-gun violence rally on 3/29 at 2pm. Teachers and staff have worked with students to create posters and draft statements to read at the event.
- Representatives from New Yorkers Against Gun Violence and students/staff from Community Partnership Charter School will be in attendance.
- The rally will be escorted by members of the 90th precinct.
- Staff and students passed out flyers about the petition and rally to local businesses
- Borough President Reynoso, Congresswoman Nydia Velázquez, Senator Salazar, Assemblywoman Davila, Councilwoman Gutierrez, and Public Advocate Jumaane Williams have been invited to attend
- NYSED, NYCSA, NYC DOE, and NYCCC have been notified about the petition and rally
- SKDK, strategic comms org, volunteered to notify their media contacts about our petition and rally
- WNYC/Gothamist will be in attendance
- WCHS media team offered to make GROW campaign video

## Academic Intervention Teacher Meetings/Plans:

## Goals:

- Plan for student academic success before T2 finals (Danielson Domain 1: Planning & Preparation)
- Review student artifacts e.g T2 midterms using "Looking at Student Work" protocol
- Support and coaching for lesson planning and instructional rigor + group coaching
- Teacher Deliverable: academic skills intervention plans outlining lesson plans & assessments + Future Planning: Academic Skills Intervention for students below grade level standards
- Co-planning support meetings with co-teachers

## **Questions Guiding The Work:**

How can we create thoughtful and intentional, skills based lesson plans? How can we use student data to outline instructional plans with steps?



## Instruction

- **T2 Finals:** administered March 14th -17th
- Opportunities provided for students to make up work for Trimester 2
- **PLC's:** continued focus on Using Assessment Data to Differentiate Instruction (May 3rd)
  - Aligns to Danielson Domains 1c: Setting instructional outcomes, 1f: Planning for student assessment, 3d: Using assessment in instruction

## Goals:

- Analyzing data to inform instruction through *"Looking At Student Work"* protocols analyzing data from recent quiz, unit assessment or mock regents.
- Teachers will be able to adapt future assessments to meet the needs of all students by explicitly designing and adding one scaffold/scaffolded activity to an upcoming lesson.
- Teacher Deliverable: outline one explicit action with a learning scaffold to help students progress towards proficiency/mastery + design the next student formative assessment to demonstrate the adjustment.



Instruction

- □ IPDP's: deadline for <u>initial</u> updates 3/10; 24 teachers submitted individual professional development plans for supervisory feedback (this was optional). IPDP's will be formally reviewed during round 2 post observation meetings.
- Formal Observations Round 2: begins March 27th May 15th and will focus on the Danielson domain growth areas from round 1 observations and other select domains based on instructional coaching goals.
- Spring Lunch 'n' Learn 3/31: topic *Differentiation*. Focus will be on **Content**, Process and Product teachers will be able to explain and apply at least 3 ways to differentiate their own classroom lessons and assessments.
- The Collaborative For Inclusive Education Visit #2 3/23: direct support with ENL programming & systems, thought partnership and support with SNAS programming & systems and targeted resources to support staff.


## COVID-19 Community Level
